# PSYCHOLOGICAL HEALTH OUTCOMES AMONGST SEXUAL MINORITIES WITH BREAST CANCER IN THE SURVIVORSHIP PHASE: A SCOPING REVIEW

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### Introduction

- Breast cancer survivors (BCS) often experience psychological symptoms in their survivorship journey.
- Sexual minority BCS (SMBCS) may experience heightened symptoms due to sexual orientation-related discrimination.
- This review aims to quantitatively assess the psychological symptoms experienced by SMBCS.

#### Methods

- Following PRISMA guidelines, Embase, MEDLINE, CINAHL, and Web of Science were searched from inception to May 2023.
- Primary, quantitative studies in English that investigated psychological symptoms experienced by SMBCS were included.

1643 studies identified

149 full text studies screened

16 studies included

- (range = 68-925).

#### Results

• 16 studies were included, 16/16 (100%) from the United States.

• The total sample size was 4802 participants, with a median of 203 and mean of 300

#### • Despite facing additional stressors in their survivorship journey, SMBCS seem to practice more active coping strategies, and have an overall similar psychological health to HBCS.

#### **Future Directions**

- Incorporate cultural competency training to better understand and address the unique needs of SMBCS
- Conduct research in other geographical regions and on underobserved SMBCS populations (other than lesbian, gay, homosexual and bisexual).

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
